RESOLUTIONS ICOPA VII

At the council meeting in Paris, it was decided to postpone the formal acceptation of the resolutions which were proposed in Paris. The reason why was because of the late final formulation of and discussion on some of the resolutions. The Societies got the chance to react upon the final proposals until June 1991. Various Societies have taken the opportunity to write a letter of support to the secretary. Only some individuals had questions about the procedure or the usefulness of some of the resolutions. No society voted against. Therefore the following resolutions are formally put forward by the WFP/ICOPA VII.

Recommendations by Council Meeting of the WFP, August 23, 1990 in Paris and read at the General Assembly of Friday 24th August 1990.

Resolution I:

The World Federation for Parasitologists (WFP) is aware of the involvement and support of WHO for research into and control of parasitic diseases including the important contributions of UNDP/World Bank/WHO special programme for Research and training in Tropical Diseases. The WFP also notes that WHO has recently undertaken a reorganisation of two divisions involved in parasitic disease control. The WFP wishes to reiterate its willingness to assist international organisations, such as WHO, involved in research and control of parasitic diseases as the WFP believes its extensive expertise should be utilised in the dicision making processes.

Resolution II:

The significance of parasitology as a scientific field of work has been increasingly recognised by institutes for promoting research and by state institutions. Specific support for research work has already started, but it definitely needs to be complemented at university level by appropriate measures. In particular, the institutes and working groups who have wideranging tasks in training and patient care, e.g. in diagnostic services and consultation, are experiencing ever greater difficulties. The shortage of staff and of funds in these fields at time of increasing demands due to tourism, AIDS, examinations of non-nationals etc. are threatening the ability of these units to function properly. Their capacities are fully tied up, with the result that scientific research has to take second place. This also means that support and research opportunities are not being utilised. Ministries and universities are urgently called upon to make available adequate funds

tand staff for parasitological facilities in their sector so as to make meaningful activities possible in research training and patient care.

Resolution III:

To stop the spread of parasites and parasitoses will require the cooperation of all parasitologists in every country and the exchange of scientific and technical knowledge and experience. International congresses represent a forum at which such exchanges can successfuly take place. For this reason the World Federation of Parasitologists calls on all its member associations to appeal to their appropriate national authorities to ban the discrimination of persons on the basis of

- nationality
- political association
- race, religion, sex or
- diseases

and thus to make attenddance at and participation in intenational meetings possible for everyone.

Uniform Nomenclature of Parasitic

Diseases - Adopted by the WFP

Council (By Tibor Kassai)

The Council of the World Federation of Parasitologists (WFP) has made an important step towards the usage of uniform and proper terms for denominating parasitic diseases or infections. During ICOPA VII in August 1990 in Paris it adopted the principles of the Standardised Nomenclature of Animal Parasitic Diseases (SNOAPAD) published in 1988 as a guideline proposed by the World Association for the Advancement of Veterinary Parasitology (WAAVP). The WFP Council strongly recommended the principles of SNOAPAD for general use in parasitological literature and practice concerning parasitic infections of humans and animals.

What are the basic principles of the new disease nomenclature?

Today there is a considerable degree of variation in spelling the terms used for denominating parasitic infections largely due to the different usage of endings -osis, -asis and iasis (e. g. schistosomosis, schistosomiasis; taeniosis, taeniasis, taeniasis). SNOAPAD recognizes that uniform nomenclature can only be achieved if two of

the three suffixes are dropped from routine use. Therefore, for coining disease names only the suffix <u>-osis</u> (plural <u>-oses</u>) should be used.

Another major source of nomenclatural heterogeneity originates from variation in the stem of words which are formed either from the nominative (e. g. trypanosom-osis, hypoderm-osis) or from the Greek genitive of the name of the parasite taxon (e.g. trypanosomat-osis, hypodermat-osis). SNOAPAD offers a symplifying revision by proposing the addition of the suffix -osis to the stem of the name of the parasite taxon which is, in general, formed from the nominative of the taxa by the omission of the last one or two letters, as in the following examples: Trypanosoma - trypanosom-osis, Sarcocystis sarcocysti-osis, Fasciola - fasciol-osis, Taenia taeni-osis, <u>Trichostronavlidae</u> trichostrongylid-osis, Ascaris - ascari-osis, Hypoderma - hypoderm-osis, Varroa - varroosis, etc. In some cases the disease name is formed

In some cases the disease name is formed from the full generic name of the parasite by adding the suffix -osis, e. g. <u>Hepatozoon</u> - hepatozoon-osis, <u>Multiceps</u> - multiceps-osis, <u>Loa</u> - loa-osis, <u>Dermacentor</u> - dermacentor-osis, etc.

For further details the original published version which also contains a taxonomic and an alphabetic list of standard names of parasitic diseases should be consulted (Kassai, I., Cordero del Campillo, M., Euzeby, J., Gaafar, S.Hiepe, Th., Himonas, C. A. 1988. Veterinary Parasitology, 29. 299-326.

Before ICOPA VII, the SNOAPAD as a nomenclaturel guideline has been sent for critical assessment to the boards of member societies of the WFP. No serious reservation or criticism was expressed. Moreover, the unanimous agreement of the national representatives in the Council of the WFP reflected that the parasitological community gave support to the principles offered by the SNOAPAD.

It is hoped that the consideration by all parasitologists, lecturers, authors, referees, editors and data retrieval services, of the benefits which may arise from the uniformity in usage of nomenclature of parasitic diseases, especially in the present era of computerized literature searches will lead to the general acceptance of the above recommendations. In this case, the name of SNOAPAD should be changed to SNOPAD, i. e. Standardized Nomenclature of Parasitic Diseases.

OBITUARIES

Gerald Schmidt

Gerald D. Schmidt, 56, Greeley, died Tuesday, Oct. 16, at University Health Center in Denver.
He was born March 12, 1934, in

Greeley.-

Mr. Schmidt attended school in Greeley and Cheyenne, Wyo., and

graduated from Greeley High School in 1952. He attended Col-orado A&M, now Colorado State University, for a year and majored in preforestry. He entered the



U.S. Navy in Gerald Schmidt 1953 and trained in electronics as a 1955 and trained in electronics as a fire control technician in Washington, D.C. He served on the aircraft carrier USS Valley Forge until his discharge in 1957.

He then enrolled as a biology management Colored Str. College and Str. College and

He then enrolled as a biology ma-jor at Colorado State College, now the University of Northern Col-orado. He graduated with a bachelor's degree and a Lifetime Teaching Certificate in 1960. Dur-ing the summers he worked as a mosquito technologist for the Center for Direct Control Laborate of for Disease Control Laboratory at Island Grove Park. He also worked as the curator of the Mortaine Park Museum in Rocky Mountain Na-tional Park for two summers. In 1959, he married Andra Riggs. They were divorced in 1979. In 1985, he married Pauline Huber.

After receiving his bachelor's degree, Mr. Schmidt entered graduate school in zoology at CSU. He received his master's degree in 1962 and his Ph.D. in 1964.

His main academic interest in graduate school and throughout his career was parasitology. After teaching for one year at the Univer-sity of Montana he joined the facul-ty at UNC and rose to full professor. He was active in research and promoting research activities on campus and had published more than 160 articles on parasitology in scientific journals, as well as six books.

Mr. Schmidt was active in establishing the Sigma Xi Club on campus and was its first president.
He also was instrumental in
establishing the UNC Research
Committee and was its first chairman. He was one of three people who established the Rocky Mountain Conference of Parasitologists.

He received the UNC M. Lucille Harrison Award for Outstanding Teaching in 1968, the UNC

Distinguished Scholar Award in 1972 and the UNC Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1975. He was a member of more than a dozen professional organizations, including serving as secretary-treasurer of the American Society of Parasitologists

for seven years.

He was a board member of the World Federation of Parasitologists, a Feliow of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene, London, and a Fellow of the Royal Society of South Australia. He was a NATO research scholar, an Organization of American States scholar and held research grants with the Armed Services Institute of Pathology and the Smithsonian Institution stitution.

He received a lifetime membership award from the Rocky Mountain Conference of Parasitologists, a President's Special Award and the Henry Baldwin Ward Medal from American Society of Parasitologist.

Survivors are his wife, Pauline of Greeley; two sons, Stephen Gerald and Jeffrey Scott, both of Denver; his father and stepmother, Gus and Lorraine Schmidt of Greeley; his

Lorraine Schmidt of Greeley; his mother and stepfather, Burton and Elsie H. Bush of Greeley.

A memorial service will be at 2 p.m. Saturday at Our Savior's Lutheran Church. Another memorial service will be at 4 p.m. Tuesday at the Panorama Room on the UNC

campus. .
